From Pastor Matheny

"Know therefore today, and lay it to your heart, that the Lord is
God in heaven above and on the earth beneath;
there is no other."
-Deuteronomy 4:39

Often times we think of people as being in one of two categories: "religious" and "non-religious". We think that "religious" people have more in common because they believe in God, whereas "non-religious" people do not. Sure, they might believe in a different sort of God or they might claim to believe in the same God but believe different things about Him but they believe in God nonetheless.

But the fact of the matter is there are no truly "non-religious" people. Everyone worships. The only question that each human being will answer is which god will they serve? Will they serve the god of the Buddhists, the god of the Hindus, or the god of the Mormons? Will they serve the god of money, the god of power, the god of prestige? Will they worship at the temple of the god of sports, or the god of entertainment? Or will they forsake all these false gods in favor of serving the one True God?

The gargantuan number of choices (most of which are not even conscious) which drive us to serve false gods in our culture can be overwhelming. That is why Christians need to be reminded (as Moses reminded the children of Israel) over and over again who the True God is and why we serve Him.

We believe in God the Father, maker of heaven and Earth. We believe in God the Son, the redeemer of the world. We believe in God the Holy Spirit, the one who sanctifies the Church by His Word. We trust in and serve this the one True God because He has created us, redeemed us by His blood, and continues to sanctify us in His church. He is the True God. There is no other.

- President Matt Brand called the meeting to order at 6:34 p.m.
- 2. Opening Prayer was led by Pastor Matheny.
- 3. There was no public/congregational presentation.
- 4. Bible Study: Psalm 139 led by Matt Brand. Next meeting Bible study will be on Psalm 30.
- 5. Additions/Approval of Agenda: Motion made and seconded to approve the agenda as presented, motion carried.
- Council Minutes: Motion made and seconded to approve the May 9, 2023, Planning Council minutes as presented, motion carried.
- 7. Pastor's Report: Pastor reported preparing for the Fall/school year and VBS went well. Also, he and Sarah Bjornstad made visits to the neighbors of the church. Pastor discussed his experience as pastoral delegate to the Synodical Convention and reported it was an encouraging gathering.
- 8. Treasurer's Report: Doug Haeder provided a summary of reports. Doug noted placement of green cards in pews explaining ways to give and less than 1% increase in the mortgage rate. Motion made and seconded to approve the report as presented, motion carried.
- 9. Unfinished Business
 - Sexual Assault Policy, Manual and Forms Revisions -Christine Billiar presented the updated policy, manual and form revisions. Discussion occurred and suggested changes provided. Christine will revise the

- items based on the discussion for the Council to review at its next meeting and requested Joe Gangi review it before approval.
- Capital Improvement Fundraising Update to Congregation - Denise Painter will provide the update to the congregation on Sunday, August 20th.

Trustees: Cleaning chairs with custodian and volunteers; continue to work on phone system; landscaping in courtyard completed; and will clean carpets after completion of roof project. **Endowment**: Scholarships allocated; sent support to missionary Vance Becker; unable to provide tuition support to Minnesota Valley Lutheran, WELS affiliated, due to By-Laws; and question about allocation of monies to the Concordia Classical Academy building project, the Board has not received a request. **Elders**: Good response to survey about service time(s); working on Board recruitment and budget; and working with ushers. Education: VBS had attendance of 23, not as high as last year and preparing for start of Sunday School.

Summer has flown by and now we are preparing for our fall activities.



TSNT meets Sundays September 10th and 24th at 6:30pm in the Fireplace room. We will begin with



LCMS Stewardship Ministry: Stewardship in the First Commandment

The greatest gift that Martin Luther gave to us was his Small Catechism. The word "enchiridion" is part of the original title of this work. This is the Greek word for "handbook." The Small Catechism is a handbook of the Bible. All the basic knowledge that a Christian needs to understand the faith and live a godly life has been taken from the Bible and distilled into this beautiful little book of Christian piety.

Luther starts with the Ten Commandments.

The First Commandment:

You shall have no other gods.

What does this mean? We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things. (SC I)

We have a God above us. He is the Lord God and we are not. He is Almighty and in control. He is righteous and good. And therefore, we should fear Him.

This God is also our heavenly Father. He wants us to be saved. He does not want us to suffer His just wrath. He has provided salvation for us in His Son, Jesus Christ. And therefore, we should love Him.

Our heavenly Father will never leave us nor forsake us. He has promised as much — and the Bible shows us that He always keeps His promises. So, we should trust Him.

In the Large Catechism, Luther explains how money and possessions form one of the greatest temptations against the First Commandment:

This I must unfold somewhat more plainly, that it may be understood and perceived by ordinary examples of the contrary. Many a one thinks that he has God and everything in abundance when he has money and possessions; he trusts in them and boasts of them with such firmness and assurance as to care for no one. Lo, such a man also has a god, Mammon by name, i.e., money and possessions, on which he sets all his heart, and which is also the most common idol on earth. He who has money and possessions feels secure, and is joyful and undismayed as though he were sitting in the midst of Paradise. On the other hand, he who has none doubts and is despondent, as though he knew of no God. For very few are to be found who are of good cheer, and who neither mourn nor complain if they have not Mammon. This [care and desire for money] sticks and clings to our nature, even to the grave. (LC I 5–9)

These words of Dr. Luther should call us to repentance; sometimes, we live and act like we don't have a Father in heaven. We seek our comfort and peace outside of His gracious promises. But we do have a Father in heaven. He does love us. All His promises are true. And the Lord will surely provide. If that is our belief, then our outward lives will reflect our belief in our acts of generosity and mercy. We will see money and possessions not as gods but rather as tools for doing God's work.
